

Letter from the Director

Boise GreenBike saw an extraordinary period of growth in Fiscal Year 2018. Thanks in large part to a month-long promotion in May our program saw a dramatic rise in the number of members and the rides they took. Boise GreenBike, along with our parent organization Valley Regional Transit, offered free rides in May as part of our support of *May in Motion*, the annual celebration of smart transportation sponsored by ACHD Commuteride.

The number of trips taken in May increased over 200%, while membership increased by nearly 400% over May 2017. Even better, the trend continued throughout the summer and into fall with strong growth in ridership and membership numbers each month.

By September 30th, the end of the fiscal year, there were over 17,000 active members of the Boise GreenBike network. Our members took 35,560 overall trips, a 50% increase over the previous year. And we did all this without adding any more bikes.

Boise GreenBike is finally coming into its own. Promotions help, but so does the fact that visitors to our community have come to expect services like bike share because they have a similar service at home.



Very close to the end of the year we moved our shop from a great downtown location (10th and State streets) that was growing too small, to a larger facility in Garden City. As the program grows in the future, we now have additional space to grow. You'll find us at 106 East 34th Street, just a block north of Chinden Boulevard.

We head into the fiscal year 2019 optimistic that we will continue to see progress in the reach of our program and the number of people we serve.







New Sign-ups

Active membership in the Boise GreenBike system topped 17,000 in FY18, due in large part to a promotion we ran during May when all rides were free. In that month alone we saw membership grow by 1,700 individuals. The trend continued through September with membership gains unlike those seen in any previous year.

NEW SIGN-UPS BY FISCAL YEAR








Membership Demographics


Age

There hasn't been a lot of change in membership demographics over the nearly four years of the bike share program's operation. Roughly two-thirds of our members are under the age of 40.




Gender

Boise continues to buck the national trend by having slightly more women than men as members.




Overall Trips

Boise GreenBike members topped 35,000 rides in FY18, an impressive 53% growth over the previous year. The upward trend started in May with a month of free rides but continued through September.



OVERALL TRIPS BY MONTH





Station Hub Activity 2018

It only makes sense that the three biggest station hubs downtown saw the most action in 2018. The hubs at the Grove Plaza, City Hall, and the Borah Post Office saw thousands of customers check out bikes and bring them back. Each of those hubs serves the most densely populated area of town. We also saw some impressive growth in the use of the hubs that were installed in 2017.



Financials

Boise GreenBike budgets look at a best case scenario, one where we successfully sell all sponsorship opportunities and increase rider revenue. That's why the budgeted figures are higher than the actuals. As with all previous years, the biggest deficit comes from the system's inability to cover depreciation costs, which alone total \$77,000.


There were increases in wages and salaries, and fringe benefits related to adding a second full-time benefitted employee.


There was a fairly substantial increase in the category of materials and supplies. Most of the additional costs are due to our acquisition of 90 used bikes from our sister system in Topeka, Kansas. The bikes, which have badly faded red paint, were a donation from our vendor Social Bicycles. All we had to do was pay the shipping.

We saved a substantial amount of money in the professional services category by shifting nearly all advertising costs to the Valley Regional Transit Coordinated Marketing budget.


On the bright side, we did see a fairly substantial increase in rider revenue. We had projected taking in about \$67,000 but generated \$88,000, thanks in large part to a 50% increase in the number of bike rides in the fiscal year 2018.










We've long suspected that the majority of our riders come from Idaho. After doing a ZIP code analysis of our active members we have discovered that the largest percentage of riders come from Boise and the other communities in the Treasure Valley. In fact, the top 28 ZIP codes are all from Idaho. Still, as these maps show, we have members from virtually every state in the union, and a few from Canada.

Kristin Armstrong Bike

In 2017 we announced the Kristin Armstrong bike, a bike painted to resemble the bike Boise's own Olympian rode to victory in the 2016 Olympics. Our title sponsors, St. Luke's Health System and SelectHealth, agreed to donate one dollar to the Boise Parks and Recreation Kristin Armstrong Youth Scholarship Fund every time the bike was rented. On February 23, 2018, our sponsors and Ms. Armstrong presented a check to Boise Parks Director Doug Holloway for \$2,000. Thanks to the generosity of our sponsors, children, families and individuals with disabilities will have more opportunities to participate in Parks and Recreation programs.

Hyde Park Station Hub

In the spring of 2018 Boise GreenBike was finally able to fulfill one of the wishes of the North End Neighborhood Association, putting an official station hub in Hyde Park. Goody's Soda Fountain owner Brett Palmateer

agreed to host the station on his property in Hyde Park at the corner of 13th and Alturas. The station hub was made possible by a Neighborhood Enhancement Grant from the city of Boise. The city also paid to have a concrete pad poured for anchoring the racks and base plates. To celebrate the station opening Goody's offered everyone riding a bike to the new hub a free ice cream sundae.
